#### **How Cousins Enrich**

Strangely like us—yet also different—these "semi-siblings" widen the warmth of family and deepen our resources of heritage

have, anyway?" a friend asked when I declined her invitation and went instead to yet another cousin's wedding. I'd never really counted before, but now I quickly calculated the total (including cousins by marriage) at 45. And, come to think of it, my best friends when I was growing up—Helen and Clare—plus my most influential teachers (of everything from the facts of life to the piano), even my severest critics and bitterest rivals, had all, also, been my cousins.

Cousins gathered at our family holidays and provided support at

funerals. In summers we went to camp together. (One year three of the four campers in my cabin, plus our counselor, Phyllis, were cousins; Gladys, the unfortunate outsider, quit in midseason, unable to cope with the "in" references.) Safely encapsulated in this large family group, I never questioned how cousinless kids got along.

But now my friend's remark made me curious to understand the unique role these friend-relatives play in our lives. Says Dr. Donald Bloch, director of the Ackerman Institute for Family Therapy in New York City: "Of all blood ties, **Our Lives**

First cousins are children of brothers and sisters, so Jane, Sue and Carol, the children of Ed, Ruth and Meg, are first cousins to one another.

Second cousins are children of first cousins, so Laura, Paul and Amy are second cousins to one another.

First cousins once removed are the children of your first cousin, so Paul and Amy are Jane's first cousins once removed.

the cousin relationship tends to be the least toxic and the most supportive. There's enough distance so that cousins are not deeply competitive or antagonistic, yet they're clearly family, with a common heritage. This makes for a nice mixture of closeness and distance."

Psychotherapist Richard Schuman agrees: "The closeness has a tribal quality---what you might call a sense of clan. Friends can drift apart, but the family tie almost forces cousins to stay in touch."

In our family a sense of clan was promoted by the tendency of aunts and uncles to use the same or similar names for their children. There were two cousin Franks and two Franceses, two Philips and a Phyllis—all versions of grandparents' names, all reminders of family history. This sense of a shared past was

enhanced by what Michael D. Kahn, professor of psychology at the University of Hartford and co-author of The Sibling Bond, calls the "family mythology"—stories about eccentric aunts and great-uncles that get passed along. Who else but cousins would know that grandfather Philip was a tyrant who had once cowed the now formidable Aunt Maude?

Our genes, too, dictated surprising resemblances. There were enough good amateur musicians in the family to form an orchestra. And today my daughter looks more like my brother's son than like her own brother. It's fascinating to share a history, but, even more so, to hear a certain turn of phrase, see a certain facial configuration in another who is not a brother or sister. Even now people who meet my cousins Helen and Clare and me comment spontaneously, "You sound just like each other!"

As children, Helen and I empha-

As children, Helen and I emphasized this similarity by dressing in identical clothes. When asked if we were sisters—or, better yet, twins we were thrilled. On weekends, when she shared my room, we became "Twinks and Twinkie," famous twin movie stars. There was

none of the resentment that often exists between real sisters.

While many people report long and ongoing cousinly ties, others report that they had drifted apart from cousins who were childhood chums, and then turned back to them in times of stress. One of these was Carol, a teacher:

"When I was a child," she told me, "certain cousins became my instant temporary friends whenever I saw them at family parties. One of them was George. After there was a rift in the family, I lost track of him for about ten years. But one day I found out he was living near me in the city. We were both lonely, and we began to hang out together. It was fun having a male escort I didn't have to impress. Shared didn't have to impress. Shared memories put us totally at ease.

"Then I got married, and my husband didn't take to George. We see each other less now, but I still feel a bond with him. A friend can stop being a friend, but you can't stop being a cousin."

Richard Schuman told of a

Richard Schuman told of a young woman who had arrived in New York following a divorce and fallen into a deep depression. Schuman suggested that she call some locally based cousins, whom she knew only slightly. "It was amaz-

ing," he said. "They immediately befriended her. One helped find her a job, which gave her a chance to pull herself together. They played an enormous role in her recovery."

Despite kinship and proximity, some cousins do not like one another. Often this is their parents' fault. Michael Kahn says: "If the parent siblings were close, they will encourage a positive relationship between their children. If they were competitive, the same rivalry may result between cousins. In such cases the 'shared mythology' often gets distorted. Who did what to whom 30 years ago becomes hopelessly confused."

Today, with many young couples having only one child or none, the multicousin pool may be in danger of drying up. Even if the birth rate should rise, the high divorce and separation rates—to say nothing of physical distances—make the prospects for future cousinly togetherness a bit dim. So I feel lucky to be in what may be the last American generation to have the luxury of picking and choosing among a large number of these semi-siblings—separate enough to have an exotic appeal, yet bound to us through powerful ties of heredity and heritage.







Garrett is THRIFTY. He had to earn the money to take the vacation with us to Idaho. In September we took our trailer to the coast for a YM YW Leadership training session. We both gave presentations. Glen's talk is included. Maxine gave a presentation on planning activities. On our way we got into a terrible hail storm that left 2 inches of hail on the ground and broke a vent in our trailer. The noise was so loud we couldn't hear each other talk.

We were privileged to attend a multiregional conference in Corvallis on August 24th. There were 8,000 people there. Brother Dallen Oaks and Howard Hunter were the main speakers. Brother Oaks said there is no such thing as going up or down in callings. We should serve where we are called for the period we are called for. We can go forward or backward depending on how we serve. He also said that disobeying the Word of Wisdom is destructive to the spirit as well as the body.

Maxine had the sad experience of speaking at a friends funeral. It was Carol Emra, one of the sisters she visited. Carol was murdered and it was a very sad occasion for everyone, especially thinking of the two children that were left.

#### Talk given by Maxine at the funeral of Carol LaChance Emra March 13, 1986

My association with Carol began about 4 years ago when Evelyn Arneson and I were assigned to be her visiting teachers. In the LDS Church we have a program that involves making sure each sister member is visited at least once a month. When we first started visiting Carol we didn't know her very well but it wasn't long before our friendship started blossoming and our assignment turned into a labor of love and joy.

We would take flowers from our gardem to her but we always left her house with more flowers than we had brought. We remembered her birthday and special holidays and she always shared bounty from her garden. Pears, plums, flowers, or something she had made especially for us. Carol didn't have a lot of money but that didn't stop her from sharing. We also shared disappointments, hopes and dreams. As all of us do, Carol had her share of problems but she also had a secret of happiness that Sir James Barrie talks about when he says, "The secret of happiness is not in doing what one likes but in liking what one has to do". A few years ago when the County was in a budget crunch and her days of work were cut to 4, she talked about how great it was to have the extra time at home with her children. When she went back to working 5 days, not a word of complaint about not being home but was just glad for the extra needed money. You just couldn't feel sorry for Carol, she wouldn't let you. For several years she drove a car that had been damaged in a rear end accident. She had not been able to afford to have it fixed but laughed about driving a car named Crash.

Carol loved and supported her children in all their activities. One friend remarked that when she would ask Aaron if he needed a ride home from soccer, he would always say, "No, my Mom will be here", and she always was. Last month she and Christy were supporting Aaron in his Cub Scouting by attending the Blue and Gold Pack meeting. While we were there they announced the Pine Wood Derby where fathers help the boys make a car to race. later in the week my husband wondered if Aaron had anyone to help him make his. I asked Carol about it and she admitted that he didn't but she just didn't want to bother Blen. I assured her it was Glen's idea. Aaron came over Saturday and he and Glen worked on the car. When Carol came to pick him up she brought a bouquet of daffodils from her garden. You could never do more for Carol than she did for you. As she left, Glen remerked that Carol certainly appreciated everything anyone did for her.

While Carol was in our home Saturday she admired the crafts Glen and I had made and took time to really examine them. She had so many talents herself and appreciated the accomplishments of others. She was never in too much of a hurry to be kind and thoughtful.

I would like to share a poem that I feel expresses Carol's influence on others.

RIPPLES

Glenda Sue Winn
I stood, one day, at waters edge;
Casting stones within.
They quickly disappeared from view
Leaving ripples where they'd been.

I marveled that such little stones Made ever growing rings; Reaching outward ever outward To touch so many things.

Once still leaves willingly bobbed As ripples passed each one. I loved to see how nature changed From something I had done.

The ripples grew beyond my view, To reach some distant shore. Because I could not see them, I feared they grew no more.

But yet another person stood On distant shores to see, The ripples made from stones I tossed; (Tho never seeing me--)

The ripples of a friend's love Extend eternally. Touching hearts and changing lives. From distant shores--God sees.

The ripples of Carol's life will continue to reach out to many.

We will all miss Carol very much, but we can find comfort in knowing that Carol's spirit still lives. When Jesus Christ and his disciples spoke of death, it was always in connection with eternal life. I find comfort in the thought that death is just another birth. Sir Walter Scott said, "Is death the last sleep? No, it is the last and final awakening." Perhaps Carol would say to us...

#### YOUTH LEADERSHIP TALK

#### FALL 1986

They say that when a person prepares a talk they should speak with authority by choosing a subject they know and understand. Well, for the past 40 plus years I've been associated with automotive industry and consider myself an authority in that field. In fact, I've been called to testify as an expert witness in several court cases, so I can speak with authority as I know and understand the subject. That's what I am going to talk about today. I've brought a few pictures along to help me.

Here you see the forerunner of the automobile, the horseless carriage, or the auto wagon. As you can see that's about all they were too. A carriage or wagon without a horse. As time passed they became more attractive and comfortable. They soon added a metal top and doors and glass windows. Today the family car is a sophisticated luxurious piece of equipment with many accessories such as air-conditioning, radio, automatic windshield wipers, stereo tape decks and you name it. As we review the progress of the automobile, I want you to realize that they all have 3 or 4 basic components that still serve the same basic function. The engine, transmission, drive axle and steering wheel.

The engine provides the power, the transmission transmits some of that power to the rear axle where it is divided and sent to the driving wheels and of course the steering wheel guides and directs the whole contraption.

By now you must be wondering what this has to do with your class or quorum. Well, I'd like to make an analogy. Let's suppose this fine automobile is your class or quorum. Let's start with the engine. That's the source of power. Let's compare that to your calling. Next we have the transmission. It transmits that power. We'll call that the 1st counselor. The power is transmitted to the drive axle. We'll call that the second counselor. The drive axle divides the power and sends it to the drive wheels. We'll call them the secretary. Now last but not least we've got the steering system. What does that represent? You've got it, the President. Why? Well, the whole thing depends upon him or her because he or she guides and directs the whole thing.

Let's talk about each of these components in relationship to your calling in the Presidency. First we have our calling, the power source. Then we have the steering, the president. Without that we could have motion but no direction. We could even go in the wrong direction and wind up in the ditch. This President is the one who organizes and conducts the Presidency meetings. It's here where, with the advice from is couselors, the agenda for the weekly quorum or class is decided. The

President also presides over that meeting but doesn't necessarily conduct it. It can be delegated to one of the counselors. Now for the wheels—the secretary has taken minutes of the presidency and class meeting. At the beginning of the meeting the President calls for those minutes to be read. Any unfinished business is reviewed and any new business is noted along with any assignments. The secretary also keeps attendance records. Let's say that there were two memebers that had been absent from the last 3 or 4 meetings. The President delegated to the first counselor the assignment to find out why they have been absent. The first counselor can delegate that assignment to a couple of class members. The class members are some of the accessories, like heater, air conditioner. They were assigned to go and visit those missing members and report back to the counselor.

Perhaps it was decided, at the presidency meeting, to have a car wash as a temple trip fund raiser. The President delegates some authority to the second counselor to organize a committee of which he would be chairman. He then organizes a committee of class members, (more accessories) to organize and carry out the project report. The assigned counselor says, "As chairman of that committee I assigned (delegated) Bill to find us a location. Bill tells me that he's arranged for a corner of the Santa Clara Square". The counselor goes on to say that Joe has been assigned to be responsible for the hose and brushes and that he has taken care of that. Dick is going to see that we have soap and rags. That is ready too. Now John was assigned the advertising and he's made up two very nice signs to post on the corners and has also put it in the bulletin. Now that project is ready to carry out. All the rest of the members are assigned to come and help with the actual washing.

That's the way your delegation and assignments should be carried out. This applies to service projects, attendance, parties or what ever.

Now let's go back to that automobile again. I want you to notice that each of these components or accessories has a specific function tol perform and that's the way it is with your class or quorum. Also notice that if any one of these fail then the whole thing is stopped. The engine, for instance can't steer, the transmission can't provide power. That's the way it is with your presidency. ONLY YOU have the keys of your calling.

I'd like to depart from the automobile analogy for a moment and share a story that was published in the Era several years ago. It was written by Bishop Vaughn J. Featherstone.


There was a young man who was hiking high in the wilderness of the Rocky Mountains. He climbed to the top of a rocky pinnacle and there was a lone scraggly tree with an eagles nest high up in it's top. Being an inquisitive young man he decided to climb to the top of the tree and look in the nest. He found that there was on large egg in the bottom of the next so he carefully put the egg in his pocket. He put it in his pocket close to his body to keep in warm, then carried it home. He then went to the chicken coop and slipped the egg in the nest with some others that a mother hen was nesting on. As time passed the eggs began to hatch and sure enough the eagle egg hatched too. The little eaglet began to grow along with the chickens and scratched for the food like them. Altho it grew to full size it still never flew. Once you as presidencies of your classes and quorums have felt the power of truly magnifying your callings. You too will no longer be content to be a barn yard fowl or just another ordinary boy or girl.

Don't be like the horseless carriage. Let's make your quorum and your class like the modern automobile with lots of accessories, full power and all the components each doing their job.




